Glen Josselsohn was born in 1971 in Johannesburg and currently lives and works in Parkhurst. Glen has always had an interest in art, especially being the son of a great artist, Gail Josselsohn. She has been his tutor and mentor, and a huge inspiration since an early age. He has studied Computer Graphics and completed many courses in photography. He renovates homes, and also has his own Interior Design company. Glen's fascination with abstract art comes from the likes of Picasso, Jackson Pollock, Miro and local African art. He loves experimenting with different colours, textures and images inspired mostly by ethnic tribal art and culture.

'The way I paint is unique', Glen says of his work. 'The last person who had a similar style was Jackson Pollock. I've been using and experimenting with the drip technique for ten years now, and I feel like I have developed a signature style. It's interesting, and it's contemporary!'

Glen paints by squirting paint from a syringe.

Glen utilizes water colours and fabric dyes on Fabriano paper, and paints on ceramic.

He loves the use of earth tones and striking colours, and applies them to most of his works.

Not only does his art buzz with energy and movement, but it opens up the imagination, engages the senses and ignites a sense of curiosity within the viewer. What really is going on between those lines and squiggles, those figures leaping off the canvas?

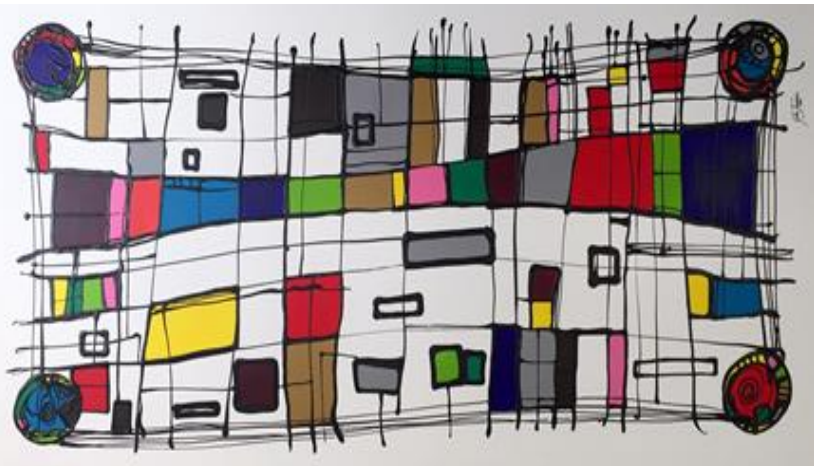
